Message from the Executive Director

On December 14, 2012 the world was shocked at the horrific tragedy that took place in Newtown, Connecticut at Sandy Hook Elementary

School. Set back on our heels, many of us immediately began a massive effort to re-introduce America to reviewing school safety practices. Over the years, educators have always made good-faith efforts to keep their students safe; now educators are being charged with developing more comprehensive emergency response plans with an "all-hazards" approach.

What else, other than school shooters, can happen in a school? Severe weather, earthquake, hazardous materials spills, assaults, drug/alcohol use, death of a student or staff member? The list could go on and on. Thus, the oft-asked question, "Are our schools prepared for these and other issues?" My short answer is yes, better prepared today than ten years ago. However, our schools must be ever-vigilant in maintaining safe and healthy learning environments as new challenges to school safety emerge.

To that end, the 2013 Kentucky General Assembly passed two key pieces of legislation: Senate Bill 8 and House Bill 354. And, on April 5th, Governor Beshear signed these two bills into law, effective June 25, 2013. Essentially, the new law will require each school to review/revise their emergency management plan in cooperation with their first responders and then train the faculty and staff on the plan. Each of the 4 emergency evacuation drills must be practiced within the first 30 days of school each year, then again in January.

I am most grateful to two of our legislators in particular, Representative Richard Henderson and Senator Mike Wilson for sponsoring these bills and exhibiting such a sincere interest in enhancing school safety throughout the state. This was a powerful step taken to motivate all schools to annually review their safe school practices.

It is, however, just the beginning. In light of the elimination of the Federal Title IV program and the 60% reduction in the state's Safe Schools allocation, the partners who comprise KCSS are dedicated to seeking restoration of the state's Safe School Allocation to its FY08 level. This level funding will allow for greater enhancements in school safety in all of our school districts, as well as provide services to them.

Many of these services are tied to alternative education programs. As school districts increase the drop-out age to 18, strong alternative education programs will need funding in many instances in order to provide an adequate education for these at-risk students. The restoration of Safe Schools funding will be a key factor in developing many successful alternatives.

As President Obama said in response to the tragedy in Newtown, "The time to act is now." Can we prevent such a tragedy from happening again in our state? Possibly not...but through this new legislation and a monumental, concerted effort on all of our parts, we can greatly increase our awareness and preparedness for possible threats to our schools better than ever before.

As for our Center, we will continue to provide services to our schools on the wide variety of issues that can affect a school environment. Further, we will continue to focus on the relationship teachers have with their students. We are convinced this remains the key element to maintaining a safe culture within a school.

Finally, on behalf of Eastern Kentucky University, Murray State University and the Kentucky School Boards Association, I would like to commend our state educators for their dedication in teaching, caring and providing safe schools in Kentucky for our most precious commodity...our children...our future.

Safe School Assessments in School Safety Th

Since 2003, the Kentucky Center for School Safety has conducted 635 safe school assessments in 152 different school districts in Kentucky's P-12 public schools.

The ever-increasing waiting list of school districts requesting assessments is a resounding testament to the value school officials and their staffs have placed on the final assessment product. Each six-member assessment team (mainly composed of current and former school administrators) offers best practices in school safety as possible considerations for the district to implement in addressing each area of concern identified based on the perceptual survey and/or assessment visit. Some examples are:

- Connectivity with Students All school staffs should continuously explore ways to enhance the connections they have with their student populations. Positive teacher (staff member) and student relationships within a school largely create the school's overall climate. Healthy school climates exist in schools where the vast majority (if not all) of the students feel a connection to at least one staff member, but usually more. In essence, the students respect and feel supported by staff. These relationships have been developed over time and are nurtured each day through an expectation of acceptable behavior from students and mutual respect and trust. Students in positive school climates are much more likely to confide in a staff member if they should be made aware of anything on the school campus that could threaten the safety of people at the school.
- II. Adult Supervision The single-most effective strategy for enhancing a school's safety is the physical presence of a responsible adult in the immediate vicinity. Ample active supervision in all areas of a school campus where

students are present during the school day is critical. Adding advanced technology and other hardware, such as surveillance cameras, convex mirrors, etc., complement adult supervision efforts but can never take the place of them.

III. Building Access – A concern for most school officials, staff members and parents, controlling all access to a school takes a concerted and continuing effort by many. Ideally, there should be only one point of entry and all alternative points of entry should remain locked throughout the school day. This requires that all staff and students be trained not to open exterior doors for visitors. Custodians and other staff members should routinely check to ensure that all doors are locked. The exterior door designated for entry should be under constant


surveillance regardless of whether it opens into the office (sally-trap style) or does not and all visitors should be screened by a designated staff member before permission into the school is granted. Each visitor should also be required to wear a school-designated visitor's badge on his/her outer garment.


IV. Bullying-Harassment – Students must recognize that bullying/harassment will not be tolerated in the school. School policies and practices must be in place at the school to reflect this stance. Professional development on recognizing different types of these behaviors should be made available for staff members. Students should be given clear procedures as to how they can report incidents. There should be multiple ways made available by school officials for students to report bullying/ harassment.




V. Teachers Social Networking with Students – Several school districts across the country have banned this practice; many others permit it but have established guidelines on social networking with students. KCSS discourages school personnel from engaging in social networking with students. As Carole Lieberman, renowned psychiatrist, told U.S. News (and World Report), "Any one-on-one private relationship out of the classroom begs for inappropriate behavior to begin." We subscribe to the school of thought that if any information is to be shared with students on-line, it should be academic in nature and posted for an entire group of students to read.

Superintendents of Schools Assessed in 2012 Evaluate Safe School Assessments





Are Using Those Funds



How the Kentucky Center for School Safety is Using those Funds



Efforts Underway at KCSS to Explore Strategies to Enhance Parent-Educator Relationships in Kentucky's Public Şchools

When examining or evaluating the varied components working in concert to create the safest schools possible, most believe that a healthy school climate and culture are paramount. A school's climate and culture are largely determined by the way students and staff members feel about and interact with one another. And, while a caring, nurturing, supportive relationship between staff and students is absolutely vital to a healthy school climate, the overall status of the parent-staff relationships also plays a key role in making a school safe. Additionally, conflict between parents and teachers can sometimes result in aggressive behavior on school grounds, creating a potentially unsafe environment.

In 2005, due to what seemed to be an increasing number of contacts to KCSS from both educators and parents concerning conflicts between parents and teachers, KCSS conducted a study to examine prevalence, frequency, levels and consequences of parental aggression toward public educators in KY. Replicated and extended in 2012, the study was conducted via focus groups and an electronic survey made available to all certified educators working in a public school in the state. As in 2005, typical issues cited as primary causes of parentstaff conflicts included discipline, grades and attendance. Several "general" strategies suggested to educators (in the study) to address these issues are listed below.

- Ensure that all parents (inasmuch as possible) are made fully aware of the School Board and/or school policies associated with each before any of them become an issue. Post the policies on school website, in student and/or parent handbooks, periodic newsletters, etc.
- Enforce all rules, policies and procedures as consistently as possible for all students, regardless of parent pressure. (IEPs, 504s, other federal regulations may legally alter discipline response.)
- Ensure that each school's community is aware that educators will be fully supported by their administration provided they have followed school/district policy/ procedure and responded appropriately.
- 4. Communicate frequently with parents regarding each child's progress, both academic and disciplinary.
- 5. Formally train educators in effective communication techniques to use with parents.
- 6. Offer formal training to parents on effective strategies to use when communicating with teachers.



Kentucky's Superintendents Assess KCSS Performance




The Web...The KCSS website's primary focus is to provide safety information to our Kentucky school people, post-secondary pre-teacher program providers, then other school safety stakeholders throughout the country and internationally. Last summer to best provide this service, the website was overhauled for cross-browser compatibility with a redesign of the content rich resources and same ease of usability. The site thoroughly and systematically covers items of interest and immediate need. We are committed to providing current information, pertinent school safety topics and quality materials to enhance and support school's safety programs and a healthy environment. Safe Schools Week...The third week in October was set aside for Kentucky Safe Schools Week. Since bullying is widespread across our nation's and Kentucky's schools, prevention was targeted in our theme "BULLYING: Be Part of the Cure!" The program emphasized the part each individual can play in stopping this harmful "disease" from becoming "viral." The Bullycure online pledge explained the concept of CURE: C-Care, U-Understand, R-Respect, **E-Educate**. It's simple but comprehensive in scope. To kick off the Kentucky's Safe Schools Week campaign, the Commissioner of Education Dr. Terry Holliday and Board of Education Chair, David Karem signed the Safe Schools Week Proclamation (pictured below, left) witnessed by **Jon Akers**, Executive Director of KCSS (also pictured) and Dr. Jack Rose, PI of the KCSS grant at MSU (pictured right). Karen McCuiston, Director of the KCSS Resource

Center, (pictured right) explained the SSW campaign before the Board. School children across Kentucky signed the online Bullycure pledge, and used the KCSS website in classrooms for 1) lessons, 2) webisodes, 3) videos, 4) powerpoints, 5) songs and so much more. All the website activities were published online in a 37 page "Booklet of Handouts". Handouts and webpages were created for a variety of audiences; students, administrators, parents and the community at-large. Newspapers, both online and home delivery, radio from Paintsville to Paducah and over 100 school and education related websites promoted Kentucky Safe Schools Week. School halls were adorned with posters, fronts of schools were decorated to promote bully prevention and over 95,000 students took the online Bullycure Pledge, and for the first time every county across Kentucky participated.


