No Such Thing As a Bad Kid! Understanding and Responding to At-Risk Children and Youth Using Positive, Trauma-informed, Strength-Based Theories and Techniques



Strength-based practice is an emerging approach to guiding at-risk students that is exceptionally positive and inspiring. Its focus is on strength-building rather than flaw-fixing. It begins with the belief that every young person has or can develop strengths and utilize past successes to mitigate problem behavior and enhance academic and social functioning. This presentation will highlight many of the key principles and techniques of this transforming modality. Areas covered include: What is strength-based practice & the power of a positive attitude & culture; the effects of trauma and positive emotions on the brain; strength-based communication principles and techniques - including reframing, using solution-focused questions, positive-predicting, core verbal interventions, and inspirational metaphors; self-esteem building & activities for at-risk children and youth; how to help cognitively inflexible young people; the importance of being family-friendly; why, how, and when to use incentive plans; respectful limit setting; and a host of creative cognitive behavioral strategies.

1. Juvenile Justice Reform in Kentucky: What It Means for Schools

ROOM 229

Eric Kennedy, Kentucky School Board Association (KSBA)

Senate Bill 200, passed in 2014, made substantial changes in the laws relating to status offenses and other juvenile justice issues. A second wave of reform is now underway, with consideration of Senate Bill 20 during the 2017 session of the legislature. While SB 20 did not pass this year, the reform efforts will continue. KSBA lobbyist Eric Kennedy will discuss the broad policy implications of these reforms, and the impact they will have on the work of school resource officers and school leaders.

2. Fighting the War on Drugs - Using Naloxone to Treat Opioid Overdose

Trish Freeman, PhD, RPh, Clinical Associate Professor, University of Kentucky College of Pharmacy

This session will review the public health problem of opioid use disorders and opioid overdose and the recent legislative changes that expanded access to naloxone in Kentucky. Participants will leave the session with knowledge of how to use naloxone as rescue therapy for a presumed opioid overdose.

Charlie Appelstein: *Charlie Appelstein, whose motto is "There's no such thing as a bad kid", has worked in child welfare for over 25 years. As president of Appelstein Training Resources, LLC, he provides original, strength-based training, consultation, and youth care literature to individuals and groups seeking to better understand and respond to troubled children and youth.*

Bob Couchman: *Bob Couchman is an officer with the Madisonville Police Department in Kentucky. He's been in law enforcement for over 25 years, and is currently the department's Electronic Crimes Investigator. For the past six years, Bob has been assigned to the Kentucky Task Force for Internet Crimes Against Children, the United States Secret Service Electronic Crimes Task Force, and is certified in both cell phone and computer forensics.*

Cea Cohen Elliott: *Cea Cohen Elliott's mission is to help others laugh more and live better. As a motivational speaker, workshop leader and stress management consultant, she brings a wonderful sense of humor and imagination to diverse audiences. She currently works with students in middle and high school promoting: Conflict resolution; How to make a difference in the world; Say NO to bullying.*

Dr. Trish Freeman: *Dr. Freeman holds several positions in the College of Pharmacy at the University of Kentucky, including Director of the Center for the Advancement of Pharmacy Practice (CAPP); Clinical Associate Professor in the Pharmacy Practice and Science Department, and affiliated faculty member in the Institute for Pharmaceutical Outcomes and Policy (IPOP).*

Bernard James, J.D.: *Bernard James teaches courses in Civil Rights, Federalism, Individual Rights, First Amendment, Education Law, and State Constitutional Law. He joined the Pepperdine faculty in 1984. He is also serves as a contributor and editor to the NASRO Journal of School Safety. He lectures in America and Canada on legal issues and serves as a constitutional law commentator for the national and local media.*

Eric Kennedy: *Eric Kennedy is the Director of Governmental Relations for the Kentucky School Boards Association. Before joining KSBA, he served on the nonpartisan staff of the House and Senate Appropriations and Revenue Committees of the Kentucky General Assembly, where his work focused on drafting state and local tax laws, including school taxes, and state budget provisions.*

Lucy Riffle: *Lucy Riffle is a retired middle school Principal and currently serves as a consultant for the Kentucky Center for School Safety and a board member for the Kentucky Association of School Resource Officers. She helped develop the first SRO program for the Erlanger– Elsmere School System.*

Ed Shemelya: *Ed Shemelya is a 30-year veteran of the Kentucky State Police (KSP), and a retired KSP Post Commander. He is currently the National Coordinator of the National Marijuana Initiative. This is an initiative within the Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP) that is responsible for assisting and improving the capabilities of the 28 High Intensity Drug Trafficking (HIDTA) areas nationwide in carrying out the National Drug Control Strategy objectives of disrupting domestic trafficking and production of, and reducing demand for, marijuana and derivative products.*
